You Can Leave The Military, But It Never Really Leaves You

Occasionally, I venture back out to the air base where I'm greeted by an imposing security guard who looks carefully at my identification card, hands it back and says, "Have a good day, tech sergeant." Every time I go back onto Charleston Air Force Base it feels good to be called by my previous rank, but odd to be in civilian clothes, walking among the servicemen and servicewomen going about their duties as I once did, years ago.

The military, for all its flaws, is a comfort zone for anyone who has ever worn the uniform. It's a place where you know the rules and know they are enforced; a place where everybody is busy but not too busy to take care of business. Because there exists behind the gates of every military facility an institutional understanding of respect, order, uniformity, accountability and dedication that becomes part of your marrow and never, ever leaves you.

Personally, I miss the fact that you always knew where you stood in the military, and who you were dealing with. That's because you could read somebody's uniform from 20 feet away and know the score. Service personnel wear their careers on their sleeves, so to speak. When you approach each other, you can read their name tag, examine their rank and, if they are in dress uniform, read their ribbons and know where they've served.

I miss all those little things you take for granted when you're in the ranks, like breaking starch on a set of fatigues fresh from the laundry and standing in a perfectly straight line that looks like a mirror as it stretches to the endless horizon. I miss the sight of troops marching in the early morning mist, the sound of boot heels thumping in unison on the sidewalks, the bark of sergeants and the sing-song answers from the squads as they pass by in review.

To romanticize military service is to be far removed from its reality, because it's very serious business, especially in times of war. But I miss the salutes I'd throw at officers and the crisp returns as we crisscrossed on the flight line. I miss the smell of jet fuel hanging heavily on the night air and the sound of engines roaring down runways and disappearing into the clouds. I even miss the hurry-up-and-wait mentality that enlisted men gripe about constantly, a masterful invention that bonded people more than they'll ever know or admit.

I miss people taking off their hats when they enter a building, speaking directly and clearly to others and never showing disrespect for rank, race, religion or gender. Mostly I miss being a small cog in a machine so complex it constantly circumnavigates the Earth and so simple it feeds

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everyone on time, three times a day, on the ground, in the air or at sea. Mostly, I don't know anyone who has served who regrets it, and doesn't feel a sense of pride when they pass through those gates and re-enter the world they left behind with their youth.

SCA Leadership

SCA Scholarship Fund

History: The Scholarship fund was established at the 2004 Reunion. Col (Ret) George Hammond accepted the Chairmanship of this committee and solicited the assistance of Col (Ret) Jim Hayes and Col (Ret) Ernie Sylvester.

The Scholarship Program is modeled after the Alamo Rotary Club Scholarship Program, with one exception, applicants <u>are not</u> limited to High School seniors. Any relative of an SCA member may apply if recommended by the SCA member.

The Scholarship Program is funded entirely by donations from SCA members. We awarded five scholarships at the 2006 Reunion; three at the 2008 Reunion; three after the reunion; and six at the 2010 Reunion. Awardees are relatives of SCA members, to include a spouse of an Active Duty MSC. Scholarship awards are distributed directly to the awardees to be used for tuition, books, fees, etc. To date the SCA has awarded seventeen \$1,000 scholarships.

Update: The response for donations from the SCA membership attending the Reunion in Colorado Springs was SUPER! We received four \$1,000 donations (the amount of one scholarship award), and one donation of \$1,700. And get this! One donation of \$5,000 in memory of COL Ellis Hall (deceased). In addition, there were many donations of \$100 or whatever they could afford...*FOR A GRAND TOTAL of \$13,957, with pledges still outstanding in the amount of \$600.*

In 2010 we were able to award six (6) \$1,000 scholarships (list of awardees is attached)

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This brought the balance of funds available for scholarships to less than \$1,000, the amount of one scholarship.

Based on the amount in the fund our SCA President, George Waters, has authorized opening the scholarship application process up in 2011, from 1 January to 30 June 2011. This is a first in the history of the SCA; in the past scholarships have only been awarded in reunion years. The number of awards will depend on the amount in the fund and the number of qualified applicants.
